The Georgia Board of nursing requires that we have a signed form (Preceptor Qualification
Record) with all preceptor names exactly as it appears on your RN license, etc. Please fill out the
enclosed form and mail it back in the postage envelope ASAP. (Or the student can mail this for
you if you'll just fill it out).
The students will be in contact with you into work out orientation to the hospital
and or floor. Many of our students are already acclimated to the hospital orientation, and only
need floor/unit orientation. This can take place in but the students are not cleared to
start "working" with you until The students will work your schedule, but if you are
out for sickness, vacation, etcthey can work with another RN, IF this is approved with your
unit manager and the faculty is aware ahead of time. The student should take the responsibility
to let the faculty know, as long as you, the initial/main preceptor have approved the time.
The clinical rotation requires the students to work 135 hours with the preceptor. The students
need to work about 32-36 hours/week for about 4 weeks. A copy of the course objectives is
available to you from the student if you would like to see that document.
Special announcement: We are excited to announce that starting this, Piedmont
College will offer FREE of charge one course towards your Masters in Nursing degree for any
RN willing to be a preceptor to our students. Once you have been admitted into the masters
program, you may work towards obtaining your masters from Piedmont College with your first class free (1 class). This is approximately a \$1500.00 credit toward the Masters degree. We are
so happy to be able to support out preceptors toward obtaining their higher education.

GUIDELINES FOR FACULTY/PRECEPTOR/STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

RESPONSIBLITIES OF FACULTY:

When supervising student preceptorial clinical experiences, the faculty advisor will:

- 1. Schedule a conference with students prior to the clinical experience to discuss course objectives, course requirements, and the evaluation tools;
- 2. Send a confirmation letter to preceptor with name of student, date(s), and time of clinical experience as appropriate;
- 3. Be available to student and preceptor during the clinical experience;
- 4. Provide time for individual conferences with student;
- 5. Visit clinical areas intermittently during the clinical experience;
- 6. Serve as a resource person for student, preceptor, and clinical agency;
- 7. Evaluate student's written assignments and clinical progress;
- 8. Schedule a final conference with preceptor and student for evaluation of student's performance;
- 9. Assume final responsibility for evaluating student's performance;
- 10. Schedule a post clinical conference with the appropriate clinical agency personnel and preceptors to evaluate the clinical experience;
- 11. Send letter and certificate of appreciation to preceptor and agency.

RESPONSIBLITIES OF PRECEPTOR:

While serving as a preceptor for a student's clinical experience, the preceptor will:

- 1. Review the course requirements, objectives and evaluation tools with the responsible faculty;
- 1. Orient the student to the clinical area;
- 2. Assist the student in selecting specific meaningful daily learning experiences;
- 3. Work with and/or observe the student:

- 4. Provide guidance, direction, and appropriate teaching to student as needed;
- 5. Serve as a resource person in the clinical area;
- 6. Serve as a liaison between clinical agency and student;
- 7. Be available to the student at all times during the clinical experience;
- 8. Precept ONLY the assigned student;
- 9. Notify student if unable to work on scheduled student clinical days;
- 10. Review student's clinical objectives regarding the selected learning experiences with the student;
- 11. Provide the student and faculty advisor an ongoing evaluation of the student's clinical performance;
- 12. Provide input into the student's evaluation via student evaluation tool;
- 13. Meet with faculty advisor at conclusion of experience to evaluate learning experience;
- 14. Notify faculty advisor of any change(s), problems(s), or incidence(s) involving the student during the clinical experiences;
- 15. Complete the appropriate preceptor qualification forms and provide faculty advisor with a copy of current nursing license.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF STUDENT:

When working with a clinical preceptor, the student will:

- 1. Review and utilize the objectives for the course/clinical experience;
- 2. Maintain a daily log of experiences as required by the faculty advisor and incorporate periodic evaluation of achievement of course/clinical/individual clinical objectives and submit to faculty advisor;
- 3. Select specific daily clinical learning experiences in cooperation with preceptor;
- 4. Plan for appropriate care of clients with assistance of preceptor;
- 5. Make appointment with faculty advisor for evaluation of clinical experience as requested;
- 6. Maintain open communications between preceptor and faculty advisor as to unusual circumstances (i.e. absence from clinical, illness, etc.);

- 7. Complete assignments on time;
- 8. Complete evaluation of the preceptor, clinical area, and practicum at the end of the clinical experience;
- 9. Not work in clinical area if preceptor is not available;
- 10. Notify preceptor, agency, and faculty advisor if unable to attend clinical (see Piedmont College School of Nursing and Health Sciences Student Handbook).
