Brandon Philpot: SAIL Navigator, Nursing Major, Campus Leader

When sophomore Brandon Philpot talks about Piedmont University, he describes it as "one big family." It is easy to see why. From his role as a Navigator in Piedmont's bridge-from-high-school-to-college program called SAIL to giving campus tours, running the scoreboard at athletic events, and tutoring fellow students, Philpot has immersed himself in campus life — and brought his signature enthusiasm with him.

In the SAIL program, Navigators are upper-level students, while Voyagers are incoming first-year students. Philpot applied to join SAIL as a Navigator after hearing how impactful it was for first-year students.

"SAIL exceeded my expectations," Philpot said. "I made a lot of new friends and met amazing Voyagers and Navigators alike. The experience was definitely worthwhile, and I'm looking forward to doing it again next year if I get hired."

For Philpot, the most rewarding part of being a Navigator is giving new students something he didn't have himself.

"I unfortunately couldn't attend SAIL as a freshman, so I didn't have a mentor. I want to give incoming freshmen something I couldn't have — helping them navigate this huge transition not only into college but

into adulthood."

A nursing major, Philpot chose Piedmont for its outstanding nursing program, small class sizes, and the close-knit, supportive community.

"Along with the professors always being kind and attentive, making sure I am doing well and setting me up for success — my expectations were exceeded. I'm glad I chose this college, and I have no regrets."



Philpot is quick to thank the faculty, staff, and mentors who have made an impact on him, giving shoutouts to Professor Jeff Bowers, Dr. Douglas Butts, Dr. Ryan Franklin, Professor Natalie Simmons, Ineke Dyer, Jalen Davis, Oliver Howington, Lyn St. Louis, and many more across campus.

He's equally enthusiastic about his many campus roles: TEAM Piedmont, MANE Leaders, SAIL, Athletic Communications, tutoring, and tours for future Lions. "Being involved on campus has changed me as a person. I feel more outgoing and confident, and I'm always looking forward to meeting new people every day."

Asked what advice he would give to new students, Philpot doesn't hesitate: "Get ready to have good time management — but also get involved! Meet new people, explore new things, and step beyond your comfort



zone."





Piedmont University recently announced the appointment of <u>Jamie Purdy</u> as its new Director of Intercollegiate Athletics. Purdy is a 2000 graduate of Piedmont College and a longtime leader within the department.

Purdy steps into the position after a decade as the Assistant Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator (SWA), where she has played a vital role in the oversight and growth of Piedmont's 22 intercollegiate sports.

Purdy has also served as the head women's basketball coach since 2005 and has established one of the most successful programs in the South Region. Entering her 21st season in 2025–26, she holds a career record of 398–190 (.676) and ranks among the top 50 winningest active NCAA Division III coaches by winning percentage.

Her teams have earned seven NCAA Tournament appearances, nine 20-win seasons and championships in three different conferences. This past season, Purdy led the Lions to a share of the CCS Regular Season crown, as the Lions validated the accomplishment by cruising to the CCS Conference Tournament Championship in front of the home fans at Cave Arena. The team was rewarded with their seventh NCAA Tournament appearance under Purdy's watch.

"It is a tremendous honor to be selected to lead a department that means so much to me," Purdy said. "This place has been home for more than two decades, and I am excited to continue building on the foundation of success."

In her administrative tenure, Purdy has helped oversee day-to-day department operations and served as a key figure in departmental planning, compliance, and student-athlete development.

From Track to the Lab: Piedmont Biology Major Heads to San

Diego State for Graduate School



Piedmont University graduate Jadon Gonzales earned a degree in Biology and Environmental Science with a minor in Chemistry this May. The journey that led there began with spikes on the track, not slides under a microscope.

"I actually chose Piedmont because of the Track and Field program," Gonzales said. "Athletics brought me there, but science is what kept me."


Originally interested in the pre-med route, Gonzales quickly discovered a passion for scientific research and environmental impact, staying true to the biology major while shifting focus toward discovery and innovation.

"I really enjoy conducting research and contributing to the world of science," Gonzales said. That drive led to multiple competitive opportunities, including a summer internship with LOGIC Environmental Consulting and a coveted position in the Microbiology REU (Research Experience for Undergraduates) program at the University of Tennessee. Knoxville.

"Earth Science Professor Dr. Debra Dooley helped guide me toward both internships. And Assistant Biology Professor Dr. Rebecca Godwin always pushed me to rise to my potential. She never let me settle," Gonzales said.

That mentorship—and the close-knit relationships built with professors and coaches—proved to be the most meaningful part of his Piedmont experience.

"I've learned so much, but the biggest takeaway has been discipline. Being a student-athlete in Cross Country and Track & Field for all four years really helped prepare me for the next chapter."



That chapter began this fall at San Diego State University, where Gonzales is pursuing a master's degree in biology. Drawn by the lab's research focus and an inspiring principal investigator, he is already envisioning what's next.

"I hope to eventually earn a PhD, do research, and maybe even teach at a university. Running my own lab one day isn't out of the question."

As he crossed the Commencement stage prepared for graduate school, Gonzales's advice to future Lions was simple: "Get involved. Say yes. You never know what doors will open."
