Legendary Lions: McCormack, Stephens Reach Career Milestones by Joseph Garwood

If you have been around Piedmont Athletics for any length of time, you will certainly recognize both Timmy McCormack and Jimmy Stephens as fixtures of the sidelines at the Walker Athletic Complex for Piedmont Men's and Women's Soccer. Earlier this season, both were able to surpass career milestones, with McCormack

Soccer. Earlier this season, both were able to surpass career milestones, with McCormack picking up his 100th career victory while Stephens notched 200.

McCormack recorded win No. 100 on August 30 with a road victory over Regent University, part of a grueling four-games-in-four-days stretch to open the season, all Piedmont wins. During his tenure, McCormack has led his teams to multiple conference championships and helped his student-athletes succeed beyond the field, mentoring three CoSIDA/CSC Academic All-Americans.



On the men's side, Stephens continues to be a cornerstone of the program as he enters his 21st season. Truly a Lion for Life, Stephens was a member of the inaugural Piedmont Men's Soccer team. Fast forward over 30 years and he reached the 200-win milestone as a head coach on September 17, when the Lions defeated Toccoa Falls 2-1 in front of the home crowd. Over his career, Stephens has guided the program to a GSAC Championship and coached Piedmont's first two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American. Cameron Earls.

Together, McCormack and Stephens represent the sustained excellence and leadership that define Piedmont Soccer, both on the pitch and in the classroom.





Dyer's Path to Purpose

The roar of engines echoed from across the Iraqi desert as convoys rolled through Camp Taji. In the middle of the chaos was a young communications specialist named Tristan Dyer, carrying more than just radio equipment. Dyer took the stories of his fellow soldiers, stories that the world might never hear unless he told them.

Dyer often found himself standing around the television with his fellow soldiers, eyes glued to the screen as it displayed moving pictures. Television often serves as a form of distraction, allowing individuals to unwind and watch something enjoyable after a long day at work. However, this was not the case for Dyer. The television was seemingly stuck on news channels, with reporters elaborating on strategy and attacks. These news stations refused, however, to elaborate upon the "human element."

"Soldiers were portrayed as though they were made by cookie cutters, all the same. I knew then that I could represent this depiction of soldiers at war in a much better light," stated Dyer.

As soon as Dyer received his honorable discharge from the military, he decided to take it upon himself to depict the stories of soldiers at war through the art of visual journalism. He aimed to capture the raw, unfiltered humanity of soldiers, showcasing their struggles, camaraderie and resilience in ways that the news failed to convey.

Photography was just a stepping stone for Dyer. While attending the Brooks Institute of Photography and earning a bachelor's in visual journalism, something deep inside him awoke—his passion for documentary film.

While at the Brooks Institute, Dyer worked tirelessly on "The Other Way Out," a film depicting one woman escaping a 15-year addiction to opiates. The film is entirely narrated by the woman, recalling the experience of her addiction and the use of a controversial method of recovery called Ibogaine. Her story is illustrated through stop-motion animation and time-lapse photography.

The film won the 2009 Best Animation award at the New England Film Festival, along with an Alliance for Community Media award for best non-professional animation.

After dedicating countless hours to work in film and documentary, Dyer has found himself at Piedmont University with a desire to pursue a career in academics as an assistant professor teaching film and documentary production classes.

Dyer has taken easily to his role in overseeing the film and documentary production major, hoping to bring a "figure it out" spirit. "Making a film is like a giant set of obstacles on the way to the goal of telling a certain story. I feel the most fun part of creating films is coming up with clever ways to get around or through those obstacles. Sometimes those solutions lead to a really compelling aspect of the film."



The Standard Never Changes: A Conversation with Professor

Garrett Kinsey

When Health Sciences Assistant Professor Garrett Kinsey steps into a classroom at Piedmont University, he carries more than a syllabus. He brings a philosophy shaped by years of competition, mentorship, and an unwavering belief in the next generation. Kinsey's postsecondary academic path began at Berry College, where he earned a degree in sports administration and economics while playing football alongside his brother, Mason. That experience planted the seed for a career rooted in discipline, teamwork, and a love of sports. He completed his Master of Science in Health and Human Performance at Piedmont, where he now teaches courses ranging from Advanced Strength Conditioning to Health Policy, Law and Issues. But the classroom is only one of the many arenas where Kinsey shows up each day.

Wearing many hats

By 4 a.m., while most of his students are still asleep, Kinsey is already at Crown Athletics—the sports performance gym he co-owns in Cornelia.

"We've got a 5 a.m. women's boot camp that crushes it four days a week," Kinsey said. "Then another group at six that focuses on strength conditioning. They're so committed—they drive in from Commerce and Banks County every single morning."

After finishing at the gym, he's on Piedmont's campus by 7:30, ready to teach his 8 a.m. classes. Afternoons find him on the football field, where he serves as a high school coach, running practices until early evening. Then it's home—where dinner, lesson planning, and dog walks with his German Shepherd, Luna, round out the day. "It's long days," Kinsey admits. "But it's very fulfilling."

A teacher at heart

Kinsey said he never expected to return his native Habersham County after college, but he now feels called to make a difference at home.

"I don't want small-town kids to ever think they're capped or boxed in," he said. "There is nothing in this world except opportunity if it's framed the right way. My job is to help students take valiant steps toward their dreams, no matter how big."

That belief shapes not just his coaching and his gym, but also the environment he cultivates in Piedmont classrooms.

"The standard never changes. The standard is the standard for a reason," Kinsey said. "We want students to feel supported but also challenged. We're not a safety net. We're straps on your shoulders to help you balance. You'll stumble, but you'll grow."

Kinsey's Rules of Life

Step into Kinsey's office, and you'll find a whiteboard covered with reminders that reflect his teaching style and outlook. Among his "10 Rules of Life":

- · Kindness is free.
- They're not giving you a hard time. They're having a hard time.
- It's not all about you! How liberating is that?!

They're not just phrases—Kinsey lives them. Whether guiding a student through a challenging assignment, mentoring an athlete through recovery, or pushing clients in the gym, his approach always comes back to encouragement, resilience, and perspective.

Looking ahead

Like so many Piedmont professors, Kinsey lives what he teaches. His business, Crown Athletics, recently expanded into a 10,000-square-foot space in downtown Cornelia, and Kinsey is eager to see where the next chapter of growth will lead. But no matter how full his days get, his central mission remains the same: helping others unlock their potential. "I love that our students here have such drive," he says. "They've got their hands in so many things, and that's the beauty of it. If you want to go do something, go do it. Right now. Don't wait."

For Kinsey, the standard never changes. For the students and athletes he mentors, that standard is set high. Piedmont is educating a generation of students who will take the standard with them as they inspire others to achieve more and live better lives.
